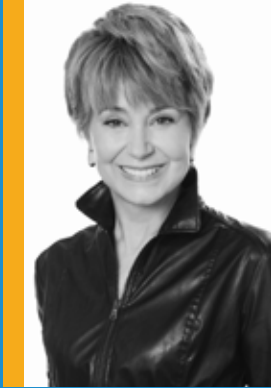

For 35 years, Children’s Health Fund (CHF) has been striving to ensure that all children receive the healthcare they deserve and need to thrive and succeed. With an understanding of the barriers that contribute to shaping health outcomes such as systemic racism, poverty, and geography, CHF leads a national network to bring comprehensive healthcare to children growing up in under-resourced communities, and in so doing closes the gap, contributing to and advocating for the health and well-being of all children.

Our national network of **25 programs** provides services in **15 states**, Washington, D.C., and Puerto Rico, ensuring that more than 100,000 children every year receive the healthcare they deserve. CHF accomplishes this by deploying a fleet of more than 50 mobile medical clinics; providing telehealth services, and visiting more than 500 schools, homeless shelters, and other community sites to provide medical, mental, dental, and social services to children and families in some of the most hard-to-reach areas across the country, from urban to rural.

In **2021** Children's Health Fund supported programs to increase access to COVID-19 screening and testing, with a particular focus on marginalized and under-resourced communities.



Thanks to CHF funding, our partner In **Idaho** was able to procure two rapid testing machines through a collaboration with the local Public Health District. This new resource enables our partner to increase testing of patients who are uninsured and have other access barriers.

Increased availability of mobile testing helped the **Dallas** program to reach further into high-risk communities. CHF funding enabled two teams to be deployed five-days-a-week to provide onsite testing at identify hot spots where vulnerable populations live within the community.

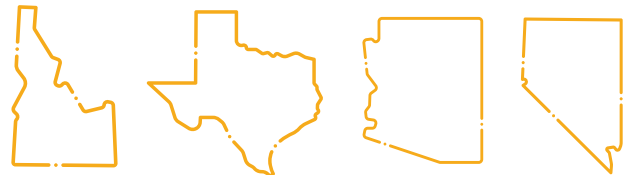

In **Southern Arizona**, where testing capacity and uptake had been low and frustration high, a two-weekend testing "blitz" program was made possible by engaging the local media and a very visible social media presence educating the community on why testing is an important component to reopening and returning to normal.

Rapid testing capability in **Nevada** was realized with our partner to prioritize high risk patients and/or those who live in congregate or crowded housing situations.
